GETTING STARTED IN LONDON

Here's a guide to help you make the most of your time in the city:

Transport:

- o **Oyster Card or Contactless** If you haven't already, grab an Oyster Card (a prepaid travel card) or use your contactless debit/credit card to travel on the Tube, buses, and trains. It's the easiest and cheapest way to get around.
- o **Download City Mapper** This app gives you real-time directions for getting around London, whether on foot, public transport, or even by bike.

Transport Options

London Underground- There are 11 colour-coded Underground lines. Services run regularly from around 05:00 to 00:30 (Sunday 07:30 to 23:30) on most routes.

Buses- A cheap and easy way to travel around London. They generally run from 05:00 to 00:30.

London River Services- Travelling by boat on the River Thames is a relaxing way to see the sights. Choose from River Buses which are a great alternative to the Tube or bus, or River Tours which are more leisurely and often include a commentary.

Walking-Walking in London is a great way to get around. Look out for our black and yellow street signs and maps – they give you useful information about the local area including key landmarks, with realistic five and 15 minute walking times.

Taxis (black cabs)- You can hail one of London's famous taxis on the street whenever the yellow 'TAXI' sign on the front is lit.









WHAT TO DO WHILE YOU ARE IN LONDON - LONDON'S MUSEUMS

The British Museum

Price: Free (but special exhibitions may have an entry fee)

The British Museum is one of the largest and most comprehensive museums in the world. It's home to millions of works, including the Rosetta Stone, Egyptian mummies, and the Elgin Marbles from ancient Greece.

The Natural History Museum

Price: Free (but special exhibitions are ticketed)

Website: Natural History Museum

Famous for its dinosaur skeletons, the blue whale model, and interactive exhibits, this museum is great for families and anyone interested in natural sciences. The Wildlife Photographer of the Year exhibition is a must-see when it's on.

The Science Museum

- Price: Free (special exhibitions require a ticket)

This museum is fantastic for science enthusiasts, with interactive exhibits on space exploration, medicine, transport, and technology. Don't miss the Apollo 10 space capsule and the IMAX cinema.

The National Maritime Museum

- Price: Free (some exhibits may be ticketed)

This museum in Greenwich focuses on Britain's seafaring history, with exhibits about Captain Cook, Nelson, and the Royal Navy. It's part of the Royal Museums Greenwich.

TAKE THE HOP ON/HOP OFF BUS

The hop on/hop off buses are an easy way to get an overview of the city and see its major sights. It also helps you get oriented with the layout of London. The Hop-on-Hop-off Bus will take you past iconic landmarks like the London Eye, Big Ben, Trafalgar Square, St. Paul's Cathedral, and Buckingham Palace. You can jump off at any stop that interests you. You can hop on and off at various designated stops throughout the day. This allows you to explore the sights that interest you most without being stuck on a strict schedule.

WALK AND EXPLORE

Thames Walk

This walk stretches along the riverbank, offering incredible views of some of London's most famous landmarks. You'll pass by the Tower of London, Tower Bridge, and the London Eye. You can start from London Bridge and walk westward toward Big Ben and Westminster, or head east toward Greenwich for a quieter, less tourist-heavy experience.

Hyde Park

Hyde Park is one of the largest and most famous parks in London, a perfect place to relax and enjoy nature.

Westminster

Head towards the heart of London's political life: Westminster. This area is home to the Houses of Parliament, Big Ben, and Westminster Abbey. Whether you take a tour of the Abbey or simply admire its Gothic architecture from the outside, Westminster is steeped in history. You can cross over Westminster Bridge for incredible views of the river, London Eye, and the entire Westminster skyline.

Shoreditch

Head east to Shoreditch, one of London's most creative and vibrant neighborhoods. Known for its street art, quirky shops, and lively food scene, Shoreditch has a cool, artistic vibe that contrasts with the more historical areas you've just visited.

Covent Garden

Known for its vibrant atmosphere, Covent Garden is packed with street performers, boutique shops, and lively cafés. You can enjoy live music, theater performances, and art galleries in this charming area, which is also home to the famous Royal Opera House.









DELVE INTO THE ARTS

The Tate Modern

- Price: Free for the permanent collection (special exhibitions require a ticket)

This contemporary art museum, housed in a former power station, includes works by Picasso, Warhol, Hockney, and Dali. The museum often hosts cutting-edge temporary exhibitions.

The National Gallery

- Price: Free (special exhibitions may have an entry fee)

The National Gallery is home to some of the most iconic European paintings, including works by Van Gogh, Da Vinci, Rembrandt, and Turner. It's located in Trafalgar Square, one of London's busiest areas.

The Victoria and Albert Museum (V&A)

The V&A is a museum of design and decorative arts, with collections of fashion, textiles, ceramics, and jewelry. It also hosts world-class temporary exhibitions, including fashion retrospectives and design showcases.

Tate Britain

Tate Britain holds the largest collection of British art from the 1500s to the present day. It includes works by Turner, Constable, Pre-Raphaelite artists, and modern British artists like Francis Bacon and David Hockney.







EXPLORE THE FAMOUS ATTRACTIONS

The Tower of London

The Tower of London is a historic castle and former royal residence. It's home to the Crown Jewels and has a fascinating history as a royal prison, fortress, and treasury. Be sure to take a guided tour with one of the iconic Beefeaters (Yeoman Warders).

The London Eye

The London Eye is a giant Ferris wheel located on the South Bank of the Thames. Offering spectacular views of the city, it's one of the best ways to get a bird's-eye view of London's skyline, including landmarks like St. Paul's Cathedral, the Shard, and Big Ben.

For a spookier experience, The London Dungeon takes visitors on a journey through London's dark and eerie past, including tales of Jack the Ripper, Guy Fawkes, and the Great Fire of London. It's part theatre, part immersive attraction, with actors bringing history to life.

At 310 meters tall, The Shard is the tallest building in the UK and one of the tallest in Europe. The View from The Shard provides stunning panoramic views of London, stretching as far as Hampstead Heath to the north and Hastings on a clear day.

Buckingham Palace

Buckingham Palace is the official residence of the British monarch in London and one of the most famous landmarks in the city. It's a place of great historical and cultural significance, as well as a working royal residence, hosting important events and ceremonies.

Camden Market
